

IN BLESSED MEMORY

Today's Gospel from St Matthew relates to us the feeding of the five thousand and the miraculous multiplication of loaves and fishes. The account of this event is to be found in all Four Gospels. From it we can learn several things.

First of all, we should note that this was an enormous crowd, almost unimaginable in size, of five thousand men plus women and children. We notice how they followed Christ on foot in the heat of the day into the wilderness and without food. What faith and devotion we see here.

Secondly, we can see that this miracle took place not for the personal vanity or glory of the Saviour, but out of compassion for the people.

Thirdly, we see also how before He performed the miracle, Our Lord took up the five loaves and fishes, and then looked up to Heaven and thanked the Father and blessed the food. Here He sets us the example of praying before eating. How many of us often forget even to make the sign of the cross before eating! And yet the Saviour Himself, 'by Whom all things were made', asks for the blessing of the Father before eating.

Fourthly, we can see how this miracle is also a revelation of the Saviour's divinity, of the power of Christ. The miracle takes place when the day is already far spent, but Christ is not limited by time; He is the Lord of Time.

Finally, in this miracle we see how Christ not only feeds us with material food, but also with spiritual food, for, as it is written in the Holy Scriptures, man shall not live by bread alone. We see this in the numbers mentioned in this Gospel. Why five loaves? The number five, as we read in the Psalms and in the prayers of thanksgiving after communion, represent our five senses, being, which is fed by Christ, the Bread of Life.

Why two fishes? They represent the two parts of the New Testament, the Gospels and the Epistles, which were written by fishermen become fishers of men, for we are spiritually fed by their writings.

Why twelve baskets of fragments? They represent the twelve Apostles who preach to the ends of the universe, the fragments who feed our souls with the words of Christ through the Holy Spirit.

Let us this day open our minds and souls to Christ our True God that we too may be fed with the Bread of Life.

EIGHTH SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST OUR VENERABLE FATHER ANTHONY OF THE MONASTERY OF THE CAVES IN KIEV

Troparion (7):

By Your cross You destroyed death; You opened Paradise to the thief; You changed the lamentation of the myrrh-bearers to joy, and charged the apostles to proclaim that You are risen, O Christ our God, offering great mercy to the world. Troparion (4):

Leaving behind worldly tumult, O Venerable Father Anthony, in keeping with the gospel you turned your back on the world, and leading a life equal to that of angels you attained to the calm haven of Mount Athos from whence you came to the Mount of Kiev with the Fathers' blessing and living there an arduous life you enlightened your fatherland, pointing the way, into the Kingdomon high to a multitude of monks and nuns and thus you lead your homeland to Christ. Pray to Him that He save our souls.

Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit. Kontakion (8):

Cleaving to God, whom you loved from your childhood above all else, you followed Him lovingly with your whole heart, O Father Anthony. Scorning this passing world as a trifle you made your dwelling a cave in the earth. There you fought well against the unseen enemy's snares and shone like the sun to the ends of the earth. From whence you passed joyfully to heaven's mansions and stand now with angels at the Master's throne. There we ask you to remember those who feast your memory that we may cry to you: Rejoice, O Anthony, our Father.

Now and for ever and ever: Amen.

Kontakion (7):

No longer shall the dominion of death be able to hold humanity, for Christ went down shattering and destroying its powers. Hades is bound. The prophets exult with one voice: The Savior has come for those with faith, saying: Come forth, O faithful, to the resurrection!

Prokimenon (7):

Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His venerable ones.

Verse: What shall I render to the Lord for all the things He has rendered to me?

Epistle:Reading of the First Epistle of St. Paul to the Corinthians.(1Cor 1,10-18) Brethren: I urge you in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you agree in what you say, and that there be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and in the same purpose. For it has been reported to me about you, my brothers, by Chloe's people, that there are rivalries among you. I mean that each of you in saying, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to

Kephas," or "I belong to Christ." Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I give thanks to God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say you werebaptized in my name. (I baptized the household of Stephanas also; beyond that I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with the wisdom of human eloquence, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its meaning. The message of the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Verse: Blessed is the man who fears the Lord; he shall delight exceedingly in His commandments.

His posterity shall be mighty upon the earth.

Gospel:(Mt 14,14-22)

At that time, Jesus saw a vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, and he cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples approached him and said, "This is a deserted place and it is already late; dismiss the crowds so that they can go to the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food yourselves." But they said to him, "Five loaves and two fish are all we have here." Then he said, "Bring them here to me," and he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds. They all ate and were satisfied, and they picked up the fragments left over -twelve wicker baskets full. Those who ate were about five thousand men, not counting women and children. Then he made the disciples get into the boat and precede him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds.
